KENNEBEC COUNTY, ss.

ON this twenty ninth day of May, 1820, personally appeared before Nathan Westcott, Chief Justice of the Circuit Court of Common Pleas, for the Counties of Lincoln, Kennebec and Somerset, being a Court of Record for said Counties, proceeding according to the course of the common law, having original jurisdiction, unlimited in amount, keeping a record of their proceedings, and having the power of fine and imprisonment, Benjamin Quimby, aged forty seven years, resident in Green in the County of Kennebec within said Circuit, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth, on his oath, declare that he served in the Revolutionary war as follows, viz. in the Company commanded by Captain Cherry and Regiment commanded by Colonel Reed of the line of the State of New Hampshire upon the Continental Establishment, for the period of three years.

that his original declaration was made before Judge Weston on the seventh day of May 1818; that he is now on the Maine Roll, and that his pension certificate is numbered 6,310. And I, the said Benjamin Quimby do further solemnly swear, that I was a resident citizen of the United States, on the eighteenth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighteen; and that I have not, since that time, by gift, sale, or in any manner whatever, disposed of my property, or any part thereof, with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provisions of an act of Congress, entitled, "An Act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States, in the Revolutionary War," passed on the eighteenth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighteen; and that I have not, nor has any person in trust for me, any property or securities, contracts or debts, due to me; nor have I any income, other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed, and by me subscribed.

Benjamin Quimby

The following is a Schedule of my whole Estate and income, necessary clothing and bedding excepted, viz:

- Twenty acres of land in Green about one half of which is under some improvement, but very rocky with an old house and barn, the more all of the value of five hundred dollars.
- one horse of the value of twenty five dollars
- Three cows of the value of forty dollars.
- one yoke of oxen of the value of forty dollars
- one heifer of the value of nine dollars.
- one two year old heifer of the value of seven dollars
- one yearling heifer of the value of five dollars
- six sheep of the value of nine dollars.
- Two swine of the value of seven dollars.
- Old household furniture, besides necessary clothing not exceeding twenty dollars in value.
- an old wooden clock of the value of four dollars
- Farming utensils of the value of five dollars.
- an old cart of the value of three dollars.

I have no debts due to me that can be collected
and I own ^{much of} as one hundred and thirty dollars.
The income derived from the foregoing
property, deducting the interest I have to pay,
does not exceed fifty dollars a year.

My occupation is that of a farmer, but from
age and infirmity am unable to labor a third
part of my time. My family at home con-
sists of five persons, namely, myself, my wife
Mary aged fifty nine years, afflicted with
the dropsy and is unable to do but very little
labor, my son Aaron eighteen years of age,
my son Daniel aged fourteen years, and a
colored female aged seven years by the name
of Sarah Gray. Except the foregoing and my
necessary bedding and clothing, I have no estate
or income whatever.

On the sixth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and forty six, personally appeared before the Honorable William Commons, Judge of the Court of Probate, within and for the County of Kennebec aforesaid in the State aforesaid - it being a Court of Record in said State John Quimby a resident of Green in the County of Kennebec and State of Maine aged fifty years who first being duly sworn according to law doth, on his oath make the following declaration for himself and in behalf of Samuel Quimby, Daniel Quimby, and Benjamin Quimby all children of Benjamin Quimby late of said Green deceased - and children and only children of Mary Quimby late widow of said Benjamin in order to obtain the benefit of the provision of the act of Congress passed July 4th 1838 - That he the said John Quimby, Samuel, Daniel and Benjamin are all children and the only children of the said Benjamin Quimby deceased and children of, and the only children of said Mary Quimby - and that said Mary was the widow of said Benjamin, who was a soldier in the Revolutionary war, and a pensioner of the United States under the act of 1818 - suspended for a while and restored under a subsequent act. And for proof of his father's

service, he would refer to the declaration and other documents made by his father in his application - which documents are supposed to lie in the pension department at Washington - This declaration further states that his mother the said Mary Quimby was married to said Benjamin, at Kingston in the State of New-Hampshire, by Rev. Mr. Thayer on the eighteenth day of July 1787 - That her husband the aforesaid Benjamin Quimby died on the 24th day of March 1840 - That she the said Mary survived him and did not intermarry after the death of her husband, but died his widow, on the 14th day of June 1842 - as will appear by the proofs hereto annexed

I Benjamin Quincy, aged fifty six years, a citizen of the United States, born in Kingston New Hampshire, now resident in Greene, in the District of Maine, upon oath testify and declare, that at Exeter in July 1702 I enlisted as a private soldier in the war of the revolution against the common enemy, upon the continental establishment, for the term of three years

in Capt Cherry's company and Lt. George Pland's regiment of the New Hampshire line. I served in said regiment until June 1703 when I was transferred into the consolidated regiment called the American regiment, where I continued to serve until the thirtieth day of June 1704 when I was honorably discharged at West Point. My discharge is hereto annexed.

From my reduced circumstances, I need the assistance of my country for support. And I do hereby relinquish all my claim to every pension heretofore allowed me by the laws of the U. States, if any; but I am not to my knowledge, borne on any pension list whatever. I request that I may be placed upon the pension list for the District of Maine.
