DECLARATION.

In order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress of the 7th of June, 1832.

State of New-Hampshire, } ss.
County of Grafton

On this 17th day of July 1832 personally appeared before the Judges of the Court of Probate Benjamin Remond a resident of Enfield in the County of Grafton and State of New-Hampshire, aged 70 years, who being first duly sworn, according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the act of Congress, passed June 7th, 1832. That he enlisted in the army of the United States in the year 1781 with _____ and served in the 1st _____ regiment of the New Hampshire line, under the following named officers: in the company commanded by Captain Eleazar Fay of Col Scammon's Regiment he thinks, but then under the immediate command of Maj Scott. He enlisted the first of June 1781 — was at the time a recruit of 16 or 17 years old and from thence marched and joined the army at White Plains in July 1781 — from thence to Peekskill — thence to Gallows Hill — thence to coldens Fortune — thence to Fishkill Landing — thence by water to Albany and from thence to Saratoga where he was discharged in December 1781 —

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or an annuity, except the present, and he declares that his name is not on the Pension Roll of any agency in any State.

Sworn to and subscribed the day and year aforesaid.

Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your letter relative to Benjamin Quinby,
a Revolutionary War pensioner of New Hampshire.

The data furnished herein are obtained from the papers on file
in pension claim, S. 18558, of Benjamin Quinby and is the record of the
only soldier of that name pensioned from New Hampshire found on the
Revolutionary War records of this office.

While a resident of Hopkinton, New Hampshire, Benjamin Quinby
enlisted June 1, 1781, served as private in Captain Ebenezer Frye's Company,
Colonel Scammell's 1st New Hampshire Regiment and was discharged in December,
1781, having served six months.

He was allowed pension on his application executed July 17,
1822, while a resident of Enfield, Grafton County, New Hampshire. He was
then seventy years of age; the date and place of his birth were not stated.

It is not stated that the soldier was married.

He died March 31, 1827.

A search of the Revolutionary War records of this office fails
to show a claim for pension on file on account of the services of Benjamin
Quinby who was born in Somersworth, New Hampshire in 1753 and married in
1789, Abigail March.
