State of New Hampshire }  
County of Strafford } On this 11<sup>th</sup> day of April A.D. 1818  
before me the subscriber one of the judges of the Court of  
Common Pleas for said County personally appears  
James Quimby aged sixty two years resident in the  
Town of Meredith County and State aforesaid who being  
by me first duly sworn according to law doth on his  
oath make the following declaration in order to obtain  
the provision made by the late act of Congress entitled  
An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the  
land and naval service of the United States in the revo-  
lutionary war That he the said James Quimby  
sometime in the month of May 1775 enlisted at Brent-  
wood in said State for eight months and entered said service  
in the company commanded by Captain Daniel Moore and  
in the Regiment of the New Hampshire line commanded by  
Col<sup>l</sup> John Stark that he served said eight months and  
then enlisted immediately for one year in the Company  
commanded by Captain James Norris and Regiment  
commanded by Col<sup>l</sup> Enos Poor line aforesaid that  
he served said year out and thereafter enlisted at Albany  
in the State of New York That sometime in the month  
of May 1777 he enlisted in Brentwood in said State  
for three years and entered said service in the company com-

commanded by Captain William Rowell and Regiment com-  
manded by Col: Nathaniel Heile line aforesaid about all  
the last year of the three the company was commanded by  
Capt Jeremiah Foggy and the regiment soon after his enlist-  
ment was commanded by Col: George Reed that he contin-  
ued to serve in said service of the United States in said war  
on the Continental establishment from sometime in May  
1775 until about the last of the year 1776 and from May  
1777 until the thirteenth day of June 1780 when he was  
discharged

That he then received a written discharge which he has since  
lost it was signed by George Reed that he was in the  
battle at Brunkerhill in 1775 Hubbardston and last  
at Stillwater in 1777 and at Monmouth in 1778 and  
that he is in reduced circumstances and stands in need  
of the assistance of his country for support

appears to my satisfaction that the said James Quimby  
did serve in the revolutionary war as stated in the preceding  
declaration against the common enemy for the term of nine  
months on the Continental establishment and that he is in  
reduced circumstances and stands in need of the assistance  
of his country for support and I now transmit the proceed-

To the Justices of the Court of Common Pleas now sitting at Celbridge within and for the County of Strafford  
and State of New-Hampshire, on the third Tuesday of July, 1820.

James Quimby aged sixty four years, resident in Meredith in said County, comes  
into court, and in pursuance of an act of Congress passed on the 1st day of May, 1820, brings with him, and in his proper  
person exhibits to said Court a Schedule by him subscribed, containing his whole Estate and Income—his necessary cloth-  
ing and bedding excepted—as follows—

one acre of land to be mine my life time  
one old dwelling House 24 by 30 feet }  
one Barn 20 by 30 feet } old and out of  
one old shoemakers Shop } Repair

one hog one pig one pinchbacks watch  
demands due me to the amount of 35<sup>00</sup>  
Due to my Creditors 35<sup>00</sup>

And the said James Quimby in pursuance as aforesaid produceth to said Court the  
following oath by him duly taken and subscribed—viz.

I James Quimby do solemnly swear that I was a resident citizen of the United States on the  
18th day of March, 1818, and that I have not, since that time, by gift, sale, or in any manner, disposed of my property, or  
any part thereof, with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provisions of an act of Congress, enti-  
tled "an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary  
war," passed on the 18th day of March, 1818; and that I have not, nor has any person in trust for me, any property or  
securities, contracts or debts due to me, nor have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annex-  
ed and by me subscribed.

And the said James Quimby doth here in Court further declare on oath, that he served in the revolutionary  
war as follows, viz.

as a private about five years partly in the second Regiment  
in the New Hampshire line commanded by Col George  
Reid in the company commanded Capt Fogg and partly in  
Col Poor Regiment in said line in the Company commi-  
anded by Capt Norris— he was discharged at West point  
he was in the following battles— at Bunker Hill— at  
Hubbletown— at Menmouth— at Stillwater



That the date of his original declaration in order to obtain a pension is <sup>15</sup> *April 1818* and the number of his pension certificate is *2707* — That his occupation is that of a *Shoemaker not able to pursue it has lost a leg - in health* — That the number and names of his family residing with him, and their ages and capacities to contribute to their support, are as follows, viz.

*one daughter Sally aged twenty four years healthy*  
*one grandson Woodbury P. Crockett aged three years healthy*

Wherefore he prays the opinion of the said Court as to the value of the property contained in the said schedule, and that the same, together with a copy of the premises, be duly certified to the Secretary of War.

day of October A.D. 1860 personally  
appeared before me a Justice of the peace within  
and for the County and State aforesaid Maria  
Rowe aged Seventy five years a resident of  
Guernsey in the State of New Hampshire who  
being duly sworn according to law declared that  
she was formerly the widow of James  
Quimby who was a Soldier in the War of the revo-  
lution and received a pension from the United  
States at the rate of ninety six dollars per annum  
under the act of March 15<sup>th</sup> 1818 that his name was on the  
Roll of the New Hampshire Portsmouth Pension Agency.

She further states that she was married to the  
said James Quimby on the twenty second day of September  
1827 by one Solomon Tamm as minister of the Gospel that  
her said husband died at Meredith in said County on the  
twenty second day of April 1835 that her name before  
her said marriage was Maria Crockett that she was again  
married to Alexander Rowe on the third day of November 1842  
by Rev. Mr. Barrows a minister of the Gospel that the said  
Alexander Rowe died on the twenty ninth day of August 1860 in  
the town of Woodstock New Hampshire and that she is now a  
widow.

She makes this declaration for the purpose of obtaining the bounty land to which she may be entitled under the act approved March 3-1853. She further declares that she has never before made application for or received bounty land under any act of Congress.

order to obtain the benefit of the provision  
made by the law of the United States  
passed the 3d February, 1833: that she  
was formerly the widow of James  
Quinby deceased, who was a Soldier  
in the war of the Revolution and at  
the time of his death was in receipt  
of a pension from the United States  
at the rate of Ninety Six Dollars per  
annum under the Act of March

1818 and that his name was on the  
Portsmouth New Hampshire Pension Agency  
that she was married to the said James  
Quincy in the town of New Hampton in the  
State of said on the twenty second day of  
September 1827 by the Rev Simon  
Dana a minister of the Gospel,  
that the said James Quincy died in the  
town of Meredith on the twenty second  
day of April 1835; that her name before  
her said marriage was Vina Brackett;  
that she was again married to Alexan-  
der Rowe in the town of Campton  
on the third day of November 1842;  
that the said Alexander Rowe died on  
the twenty ninth day of August 1860  
leaving the declarant his widow.  
She further declares that she was not  
married to the said James Quincy  
prior to the second of January eighteen  
hundred, but at the time above stated.  
She further declares

that she still remains a widow.
