personally appears before me Samuel Green an attorney justice
of the Superior Court of Judicature in and for said State first County
a resident of ~~Rockingham~~ in said County aged seventy one years who
being first sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the
following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress
passed June 7. 1832.

That sometime in the month of April 1775, he enlisted into a company
of infantry at Newhill Massachusetts, to serve in the Revolutionary War
for the term of eight months. Moses McFarland of said Newhill
was his Captain, David Bradley of the same place the Lieutenant and
Jacob Lumby of Hampsfield, New Hampshire the Ensign. That the
first of May following his enlistment, he received orders to march
west to Newhill, and at the house of said David Bradley, was inspected
and passed muster. On the second day of the same May he marched
with the rest of the Company for Cambridge Mass. and stopped the
first night at Braintree in Charlestown Mass. the next morning
marched to Boston meetinghouse where they were detained until
the next day in consequence of a Counter-attack at Bunker Hill, in which
one of the Officers of the company was called upon to sit. The next
day marched to Cambridge Mass. quartered in a barn near the
College, which was said to be owned by a boy named Phipps and
was then fled. After arriving at Cambridge the Company was
attached to the Regiment commanded Col. John Nixon and Thomas
Nixon was Lieut Col^t the adjutant name was Holden, quartered
in said barn until after the battle of Bunker Hill, when the company
went to Charlestown Mass. and quartered for a short time in a house
owned by a Mr. Eaton, and on the 1st instant his Captain was severely
wounded in his shoulder in the battle of Bunker Hill. The
company then went to Winter Hill and were stationed at that place
until his term of service expired but received no written discharge.

That Jacob Lumby of Hampsfield and Mark Emerson of Groton both
in said New Hampshire State, were in the same Company and
Regiment with him during said service.

And the said Lumby further declares that ten days before the expiration
of the said term of enlistment above mentioned, which was about the
middle of December 1775, he again enlisted for the term of one
year into a company commanded by the aforesaid Capt. Mose
McFarland and said Jacob Lumby was Lieutenant, and Joseph
Wood Ensign. That he served in said company under his last
enlistment at said Winter Hill until some time in February
following. - that some time the first of February 1776 he got
discharged by General George Washington but received no
written discharge. The occasion of his being thus discharged

That he did not apply for his pension until the 1st instant and
that he did not apply for it because he did not know what would
affect his case and on his application was discharged as above
stated, which last term of service was nearly two months -
of this last last term of service of two months ~~he~~ has no
documentary evidence and knows of no person living who
can testify to it. He has the depositions of Mark Emerson
and Benjamin Eastman in relation to the aforesaid first
term of service which are hereto annexed.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension
or annuity, except the present, and declares that his name
is not on the pension roll of the agency of any State.

who was a Private in the Army of
the United States in the revolutionary
war, and who served therein a period
of eight or nine months as she has
been informed and verily believes
— And for the evidence of this record
and the length of time for which he
served she respectfully refers to
his Application for a Pension and
the evidence accompanying the
same on file in the Public Offices at
Washington — He having been a
Revolutionary Pensioner of the United
States under the Act of 1832 (as she be-
lieves) for a short time previous to his
death (on the New Hampshire Agency)
She does not know the date of his certif-
icate but thinks it was granted in
1832

She further declares that she was married to the said Jacob Grinby on the sixteenth day of December A.D. one thousand eight hundred and eighty seven; that prior to her marriage her name was Anna Skinner; that her husband the aforesaid Jacob Grinby died at Highgate appeared on the twenty third day of March A.D. 1833; that she was not married prior to his leaving the service, but the marriage took place previous to the first of January seventeen hundred and ninety four A.D. at the time above stated; and that since the death of the said Jacob Grinby she hath never intermarried with anyone and still is his widow.
