County of Rockingham. On this 20th day of August 1832
personally appeared before me Samuel Green an associate justice
of the Superior Court of Judicature in and for said State Jacob Dimby
a resident of ~~Hampton~~ in said County aged seventy one years who
being first sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the
following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress
passed June 7. 1832.

That sometime in the month of April 1775, he enlisted into a company
of infantry ^{from said Hampton} at Haverhill Massachusetts, to serve in the Revolutionary War
for the term of eight months. Moses McFarland of said Haverhill
was his Captain, David Bradley of the same place the Lieutenant and
Jacob Dimby of Hampton, New Hampshire the Ensign. That the
first of May following his enlistment, he received orders to march,
went to Haverhill, and at the house of said David Bradley, was inspected
and passed muster - On the second day of the same May he marched
with the rest of the company for Cambridge Mass. and stopped the
first night at Braze Tavern in Andover Mass. - the next morning
marched to Woburn meetinghouse where they were detained until
the next day in consequence of a court martial at ^{the} place, in which,
one of the Officers of the company was called upon to sit - The next
day marched to Cambridge Mass. quartered in a barn near the
College which was said to be owned by a Tory named Phips and
who had fled. After arriving at Cambridge the company was
attached to the Regiment commanded by Col. John Nixon and Thomas
Nixon was Lieut. Col. the adjutant's name was Holden, quartered
in said barn until after the battle of Bunker Hill, when the company
went to Charlestown Mass. and quartered for a short time in a house
owned by a Mr. Nelson, said Mr. Farland in his capture was severely
wounded in his neck his shoulder in the battle of Bunker Hill - The
company then went to Winter Hill and were stationed at that place
until his term of service expired but received no written discharge.

That Jacob Dimby of Hampton and Mark Emerson of Sperry both
in said New Hampshire State, were in the same company and
Regiment with him during said service.

And the said Dimby further declares that ten days before the expiration
of the said term of enlistment above mentioned, which was about the
middle of December 1775, he again enlisted for the term of one
year into a company commanded by the aforesaid Capt. Moses
McFarland and said Jacob Dimby was Lieutenant, and Joseph
Hood Ensign - That he served in said company under the last
enlistment at said Winter Hill until some time in February
following, - that some time the first of February 1776 he got
discharged by General George Sullivan but received no
written discharge. The occasion of his being thus discharged

and the rest of his papers, and on the 1st of August 1842
was taken into custody and on his application was discharged as above
stated, which last term of service was nearly two months
of this last term of service of two months ~~he~~ has no
documentary evidence and knows of no person who
can testify to it. He has the depositions of Mark Emerson
and Benjamin Eastman in relation to the aforesaid first
term of service which are hereto annexed.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension
or annuity, except the present, and declares that his name
is not on the pension roll of the agency of any State.

a resident of Kingston in said County
aged forty six years and upwards
who being first duly sworn according
to law doth on her oath make the follow-
ing declaration in order to obtain the
benefit of the provision made by the
Act of Congress passed July 7 1830 entitled
"An Act granting half pay and Pensions
to certain widows" That she
is the widow of Jacob Dwinby late
of Hampton in said County deceased
who was a Private in the Army of
the United States in the revolutionary
war and who served therein a period
of eight or nine months as she has
been informed and verily believes
— And for the evidence of this service
and the length of time for which he
served she respectfully refers to
his Application for a Pension and
the evidence accompanying the
same on file in the public office at
Washington — he having been a
Revolutionary Pensioner of the United
States under the Act of 1832 (as she be-
lieves) for a short time previous to his
death. (in the New Hampshire County)
She does not know the date of his certifi-
cate but thinks it was granted in
1832

She further declares that she was
married to the said Jacob Trimby
on the sixteenth day of December 1722
the said Jacob being then aged
seventy; that prior to her marriage
her name was Anna Timmer;
that her husband the aforesaid Ja-
cob Trimby died at Hampton
Virginia on the twenty third day of March
AD 1733; that she was not married
prior to his leaving the service, but
the marriage took place previous to
the first of January seventeen
hundred and ninety four or at
the time above stated; and that
since the death of the said Jacob
Trimby she hath not inter-
married but remains and still
is his widow. ^{her} Anne + Trimby

ficate is numbered, 4242, and is dated
12th of March 1844, and is made payable at
the Portsmouth Agency, N. Hampshire. She
never applied for nor received any bounty land
under any Act of Congress. In proof of her mar-
riage & widowhood she refers to evidence on file
at the Pension Office, on her Application for a
Pension. That she is now a widow and continues
the widow of said Jacob Quincy, who was a
Pensioner up to the time of his death.
