On this 18th Day of Oct 1832 Personally appeared
in Open Court before the Judges
of the Court of Common Pleas
now sitting John Quincy a resident of the
Town of Brown in the County of Oneida
and State aforesaid aged seventy ~~two~~ ^{two} years
himself the who being first duly sworn
according to law hath on his oath made
the following Declaration in order to obtain
the benefit of the Act of Congress passed
June 7th 1832 That he entered the service
of the United States under the following
named officers and served as hereinafter stated
That he Enlisted into the nine months
service and served up to the Term and
was Discharged ^{the first of January} in the year 1832 by Col
Whiting and received a written Discharge
at Harsenick in the State of Connecticut
The Captain's Name under whom he Enlisted
was Hart who was afterwards broken for
Disobedience of Orders and sent home
Lieutenant Beattie then took the command
of said Company and went to Fort Hill
and was Stationed there one month were
then ordered to Peekskill were stationed
there about one month then went to the
Lake Pitts on the Sea Shore near West Chester
were stationed there until about one month
before our terms of service expired were
then ordered the Harsenick stayed out
the time of Enlistment and went home
Col White Commanded the Regiment and
Gen Sullivan the Major at the time
above mentioned

This Report further saith that John Standeford one of his No. 2-bars was drafted after his return home he thinks in the month of February 1778 that he this Report took the name of said Standeford as a substitute in Capt. Gidians Company the first name was Briggs Ensign Beck of Fairfield Sullivans Regt and served for a term of Two months was discharged and went home

In the month of May 1778 this Report was drafted and sent to Howe N.Y. and from there the Barracks served Two months under Capt. Gidians Lieutenant Siler Ensign Hubbard we found the Regiment Commanded by Col. Mears was discharged and went home

In the year 1777 was a man drafted in the month of July and went to Howe N.Y. in Capt. Hubbells Company Col. Whites Regiment and this time Fairfield was burned he was in the skirmish at Red Bank when the Town was burned by the British served Two months was discharged and returned home

This Report further saith that he was called out with the militia in cases of Alarm at different times besides those already related from the year 1777 until the year 1783 and served more than Twelve months — some times we were out Two weeks sometimes Three or four days as the case required that he served as above related in the Companies of Capt. Gidians Capt. Hubbard and Capt. Hart

That he lived on ^{on} the sea shore in the Town of New Fairfield Conn. when the militia were almost continually sent to guard the shore

He further saith that he was born in the Town of New Fairfield C. T. in the year 1768 has a record of his age in books at home

that he was a resident of the Town of
New Fairfield Ct when called in the
Army and also upon the War Office
He was called for from the New
Hampshire County N.H. since the Twenty
Eighth year from the 1838 in the County
of Genesee when he has resided about Eighteen
years

That he had a written discharge from the
nine months service and that the discharge
was burned in the year 1839 in his Father's
House together with a Box after a death of
his Parents.

He is acquainted with Doctor Samuel Tappan
Elder Martin Calverton Deacon Wilcox and
James Tappan Esq. a Judge of Genesee
County Ohio and many others who
can attest to his character for Truth &
Sincerity and also their belief of his
Non-alienary services
