Act June 7, 1832

Declarations in order to obtain the benefits of the act of
Congress of the 7th June 1832
State of Vermont

Essex County ss On this 15th day of August AD 1832

Personally appeared in open Court before
the Hon. William Gates Judge of the Court of Probate within
and for the County of Essex in the district of Essex and State
of Vermont now sitting Moses Quimby a resident of the
Town of Lunenburg in the County of Essex and State of Vermont
aged seventy six ^{years} who being first duly sworn according to law
doth on his oath make the following declaration in order
to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7th 1832
that he enlisted in the service of the United States under the follow-
ing names officers and services as herein stated -
That the first part of May AD 1775 he enlisted in the town of
Hamsters in the State of New Hampshire in a Company com-
manded by Capt Huchewich Theterson in Col James Beedes
Regiment of the New Hampshire line for the term of Eight months
immediately marched to Mistic in Mopackuseth and Branters Hill
that the Regiment was belonging to Gen. Sullivans Brigade
he was at the battle of Branters Hill was wounded by a mis-
set ball in the shoulder in that battle was carried to Cambridge
and from thence to Mistic hospital after he recovered he
again joined the said Company which was then stationed
on Winter Hill that he served in d Company & kept the
full period of his enlistment which was eight months
but can not tell precisely the day of his enlistment or dis-
charge he never received any written discharge that this
above service was in the Continental troops - he then returned
home at Hamsters and the next year he came to Northam-
berland in the upper part of said State of New Hampshire where
he resided until AD 1778 and in the month of April 1778
he enlisted in d Northumberland in to a Company command-
ed by Capt Luther Puskasaw in Col Timothy Beedes Regt
New Hampshire State troops raised for the defence of the
frontier on Connecticut ^{River} for the term of one year that
he was stationed at Haverhill in the State of New Hampshire
and served in d Company & kept one full year that he
was born as he has been in farm in Derington New Hamp-
shire in the 1757 and has been told that his birth is exact
in that town that in the year 1781 he removed to Lunenburg
where he now resides that he has no documentary evidence
and that he knows of no person who can testify to his service
in the year AD 1775. he has the depositions Major James
Lucas & Elijah Blodgett as to the service in Col Beedes Regt
which are hereunto hereunto

be hereby relinquished every claim whatsoever to a pension
in any manner except the present and declares that
his name is not on the pension roll of the agency
of any State. Sworn and subscribed the day and

We Jeremiah Glines a Clergyman residing in
Lunenburg in the County of Essex and State of Vermont
and Geo. Carleton residing in the same Lunenburg
hereby certify that we are well acquainted with
Moses Quimby who has subscribed and sworn to the
above declaration that we believe him to be 75 years of
age that he is reputed and believed in the neighborhood
where he resides to have been a soldier of the revolution
and that we concur in that opinion.

And the Court do hereby declare their opinion after
the investigation of the matter and after putting the witness
oath prescribed by the War Department that the above named
applicant was a revolutionary soldier and served as he states.
And the Court further certifies that it appears to them that Jere-
miah Glines who has signed the preceding certificate is a Clergyman
resident in the town of Lunenburg in the County of Essex and State
of Vermont and that George Carleton who has also signed the same
is a resident in said Lunenburg and is a credible person and that
their statement is entitled to credit

Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your letter addressed to The National Archives, in which you request the Revolutionary War record of Moses Quimby. Your letter has been referred, for reply, to The Veterans Administration, custodian of Revolutionary War pension claims.

The data contained herein were obtained from the papers on file in the Revolutionary War pension claim, based upon the military service in that war of Moses Quimby.

Moses Quimby was born in 1757, in Kingston, New Hampshire. The day and month of his birth and the names of his parents are not shown.

While a resident of Hampstead, New Hampshire, he enlisted the first part of May 1775, served eight months in Captain Hezekiah Hutchins' Company, Colonel James Reed's New Hampshire Regiment and was in the battle of Bunker Hill, where he was wounded by a musket ball in his shoulder. In 1776, he moved to Northumberland, Grafton County, later Coos County, New Hampshire, and while living there enlisted in April 1778, and served one year as private in Captain Luther Richardson's Company, Colonel Timothy Bedel's Regiment.

In 1781 he moved to Lunenburg, Vermont.

He was allowed pension on his application executed August 15, 1832, while a resident of Lunenburg, Essex County, Vermont.

There are no family data.

In order to obtain the date of last payment of pension, the name of person paid and possibly the death date of soldier, you

should apply to the Comptroller General, General Accounting Office,
Records Division, Washington, D. C., and cite the following data:
"Moses Quinby, certificate No. 18055, issued September 24, 1933,
rate \$66.66 per annum, commenced March 4, 1931, Act of June 7, 1932,
Vermont Agency".
